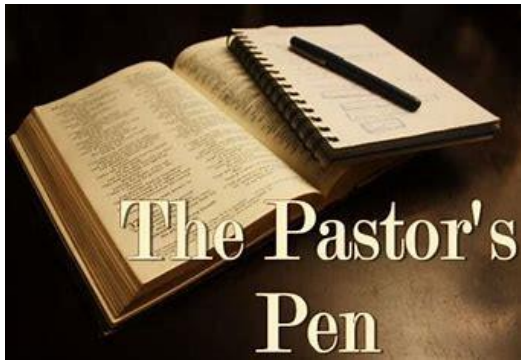
kingdom of God above all else, and live righteously, and He will give you everything you need. (NLT)"

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Young Adult Ministry Month

I think many in the church will agree that, by and large, we have a “young adult problem.” What’s the problem, you ask? Well, young adults are not coming to our churches.

There are all sorts of methods out there to get young people into coming to church. Many church leaders have made strides in adding to a body of work on attracting young people. Some of the material is really good — material that recognizes the world of 2024 is vastly different than the world of 1952 or even 1982. Other material is just plain bad — material that tries to bait-and-switch young people into church by selling a notion of volunteerism or bland ideal community while conveniently forgetting to mention the name of Jesus because it doesn’t play well for focus groups. While there’s no real clear answer on how to get young people into church, I think we can all agree on this simple fact: *We’ve got a major deficit of young people actively involved in the local churches.*

What are we at First Baptist Church Fairfield doing about this young adult problem?

Let me cut to the chase and say what we should NOT try to do: **If we want to “solve” the problem of young people not being active in church, we are going to fail from the outset. This is not a problem we can solve in isolation.** So if we bought the latest material on how to magically attract young people after following 5 easy steps, take it back right now. Instead of solving our problems, let’s try to look at them in new ways — maybe even as opportunities to learn.

Translation is Key

What we need is for the church to become a place of translation — not just interpretation. What’s the difference? **Interpretation simply means that a church tells you what to believe and how to behave. But we must take the work of trans-**

lation seriously, it will also create ways to live out those beliefs and morals in community. When this happens, the church becomes less rigidly judgmental of others and more serious about the need we all have for redeeming and sustaining grace.

Let me offer a story to illustrate:

I heard another heart-breaking story from a young adult who refuses to go to church. It seems that she was marginally involved in a local church — some months were better than others for attendance. But she volunteered in the ministry some and helped with Vacation Bible School because she didn’t really know what to think about church attendance yet she knew it was important for her daughter. She started dating a young man who was a member of the church soon after she started attending.

But a few months into her tenure in the church it started. It seems a few of the members — some younger and some old enough to be her mother — caught wind of her “past life.” They began spreading stories around the church about her and her new relationship — much of which was nowhere near to being true. But truth is relative when perception shapes so much of how we think. It wasn’t long before a whole section of the church had heard these stories and it got back to the young woman and her new boyfriend.

Needless to say, they refuse to go back to that church and I fear they’re done with church altogether after that incident.

One of the reasons we in the church won’t ever solve our issue with young adults is that we think it’s really their problem. They want to come to church and be with us, they just don’t know it yet. So we need to invest in all sorts of attractational methods to help them realize this deep longing. **Churches and we are not perfect — nor should we ever think they will be — but as long as church people do mean things to people who are a little different, don’t be surprised when *no* young people want to attend our church.** This girl bears the burden of not wholeheartedly investing in the church. But that’s a process for many people, old and young alike. However, she’s not at fault for the fact that some people decided her past was too risqué for their taste and decided to spread rumors about it.

A community who takes the work of translation — living out the gospel, putting hands and feet on the love of God, etc. — might not have been so quick to judge someone who was a little different. A community of translators knows how hard it is to actually live the morals and beliefs they profess.

Young Adult Ministry is crucial in the church for several reasons:

If we want young people in our church, we must go where they are. Learn what they do. Strike up a relationship and trust the Holy Spirit enough to let us know when it's time to invite them to church. In the meantime, we must make sure our church is a place that worries about doing justice, loving kind-

ness, and walking humbly with God (Micah 6:8). After all, that's all disciples can hope to do.

Overall, Young Adult Ministry plays a pivotal role in nurturing the next generation of church leaders and believers, ensuring a vibrant and sustainable church community. Let us pray diligently for this new ministry in First Baptist Church Fairfield that is called L.I.F.E. as we celebrate them throughout the month of September.

But upon taking part, you find it leads to your life's calling. Or someone crosses your path, but overlooking their worth, you brush them aside, missing out on a blessing God had for you through them.

And what about you? Do you undervalue yourself as "nothing special," just an "ordinary" person? Look closer; think again. For an ordinary baby born long ago to an ordinary couple in an ordinary stable in an ordinary town was none other than ... God's Son! And you? Why, you are also an extraordinary child of God!

Goals for your church



Pastor and professor Howard Clinebell Jr. described the ideal local church as one that strives to become "a healing, growth-stimulating, redemptive organism." Each congregation, he wrote, should work to develop "a dynamic climate of mutual concern which gradually seeps into and saturates the whole fellowship."

How can your church body meet those goals? For starters, compare your mission, ministry, outreach and attitudes to the early church.

The New Testament reveals that a fellowship of believers should engage in these activities together: worshiping (Acts 2:46-47), studying (Acts 2:42), witnessing (Acts 2:44-47; 3:9), serving (Acts 6:1-6; 20:35), loving (Hebrews 10:24), praying (Acts 1:14; 12:12), cooperating (Acts 1:11-14; 2:1; 4:23) and suffering for the sake of the gospel (Hebrews 10:32-34; Philipians 1:29).

In addition, Jesus calls New Testament believers to live joyfully (Acts 2:46; 5:40-41; 13:50-52; 16:25), courageously (Acts 4:13; 4:29; 15:26), powerfully (1 Corinthians 4:20), enthusiastically (Acts 2:43-47) and generously (Acts 2:45; 2 Corinthians 9:10-12). May the Holy Spirit equip us to heal, grow and mutually edify one another!

September: Suicide Prevention

September is suicide prevention awareness month. Suicide is the act of intentionally causing one's own death. A suicide attempt is when someone harms themselves with the intent to end their life but does not die as a result.

In 2022, suicide was responsible for 49,476 deaths in the U.S., which is about one death every 11 minutes. It is a leading cause of death among people aged 10-41.

Warning signs for suicide include:

- Behavioral Changes: Withdrawal from friends and family, giving away possessions, and drastic mood swings.
- Verbal Cues: Talking about wanting to die, feeling hopeless, or being a burden to others.
- Physical Symptoms: Changes in eating or sleeping habits, increased use of alcohol or drugs.

Suicide Myths

There are several myths about suicide that can contribute to misunderstanding and stigma. Here are some common ones:

Myth 1: People who talk about suicide won't really do it.

Fact: Many people who are suicidal give warnings or talk about their intentions. It's important to take any talk of suicide seriously and offer support.

Myth 2: Suicide happens without warning.

Fact: There are often warning signs, such as changes in behavior, mood, or talking about feeling hopeless. Recognizing these signs can help in providing timely intervention.

Myth 3: Once someone decides to die by suicide, nothing can stop them.

Fact: Suicidal thoughts can be temporary. With the right support and treatment, people can recover and find reasons to live.

Myth 4: Only people with mental illnesses are suicidal.

Fact: While mental illness is a significant risk factor, not everyone who is suicidal has a diagnosed mental illness. Various factors, including life events and stress, can contribute to suicidal thoughts.

Myth 5: Talking about suicide will give someone the idea.

Fact: Openly discussing suicide can actually reduce the risk by allowing individuals to share their feelings and seek help. It shows that you care and are willing to listen.

Myth 6: People who attempt suicide are just seeking attention.

Fact: Suicide attempts are often a cry for help. They indicate severe distress and should be taken seriously, regardless of the perceived intent.

Myth 7: Suicidal people are always depressed.

Fact: While depression is a common factor, people experiencing other emotions like anxiety, anger, or even relief can also be at risk.

Myth 8: Once a person is suicidal, they will

The National Baptist USA, INC. serves eight African countries and three Islands. Foreign Mission is still a priority at our Church. Our focus today is on Malawi.

Malawi, officially the Republic of Malawi, is a landlocked country in southeastern Africa. It is bordered by Zambia to the west, Tanzania to the north and northeast, and surrounded by Mozambique on the east, south and southwest. Malawi spans over 118,484 km² (45,747 square mi) and has an estimated population of 18,143,217 (as of July 2018). Malawi is primarily a Christian country, with a significant Muslim minority. Government surveys indicate that 87% of the country is Christian, with a minority 11.6% Islamic population. The largest Christian groups in Malawi are the Roman Catholic Church, of which 19% of Malawians are adherents, and the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian (CCAP) to which 18% belong. The CCAP is the largest Protestant denomination in Malawi with 1.3 million members.

Other religious groups within the country include Jehovah's Witnesses (over 95,000),¹The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints with just over 2,000 members in the country at the end of 2015, Rastafarians, Hindus, Baha'is, (0.2%) and

around 300 Jews. Atheists make up around 4% of the population, although this number may include people who practice traditional African religions that do not have any gods.

Thanks to each of you, The National Baptist Convention expanded its outreach to Malawi in 2012 and has been very instrumental in assisting our mission partners with resources necessary to make much-needed upgrades to the Willie Layton Maternity Hospital's medical technology, and continuing to share the "Good News of Jesus Christ" as a sound foundation to allow all to be partakers of the gift of salvation.
