¹⁷ When they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted.


¹⁸ Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me.

THINK ON THESE THINGS...



During the Lenten season, which begins on Ash Wednesday (March 5 this year), Christians figuratively follow Jesus into the desert. Just as our Savior spent 40 days fasting and facing temptation, we focus on self-reflection and contrition.

In an 1873 hymn, Claudia Hernaman wrote, "O Lord, throughout these forty days, you prayed and kept the fast. Inspire repentance for our sin, and free us from our past."

The desert experi-

ence of Lent serves a clear purpose, filling us up rather than depleting us. "This is what Lent is meant to be," writes theologian Ron Rolheiser. "Time in the desert to courageously face the chaos and the demons within us and to let God do battle with them through us. The result is that we are purified, made ready, so the intoxicating joy of Easter might then bind us more closely to God and each other."

Fasting and feasting

During Lent, consider this practical — and biblical — advice from Arthur Lichtenberger, a former presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church:

- Fast from criticism, and feast on praise.
- Fast from self-pity, and feast on joy.
- Fast from ill-temper, and feast on peace.
- Fast from resentment, and feast on contentment.
- Fast from jealousy, and feast on love.
- Fast from pride, and feast on humility.
- Fast from selfishness, and feast on service.
- Fast from fear, and feast on faith.

An old hymn declares:

I heard the voice of Jesus say, "Come unto me and rest.

Lay down, O weary one, lay down your head upon my breast."

I came to Jesus as I was, so weary, worn and sad. I found in him a resting-place, and he has made me glad. (Horatius Bonar, 1846)

Many people these days feel exhausted by division, the news, hatred that seems louder than love. More than ever, we who are "weary, worn, and sad" need to hear Jesus say, "Come unto me and rest."

Jesus wants to be our resting place — but not so we can hide forever from reality. Instead, he offers a place of refreshment where we can relax long enough to remember that not everything is bad; there is gospel to share. Not everything is hatred; God's love is stronger.

Resting in Jesus, we focus on God's goodness. We are reminded of love shown by kind people to those in trouble, bold voices speaking for justice, warm friendships that brighten our days. Gladdened by rest, we rise again. Jesus walks with us, as always. We can lean on him every step of the way.

It is said that these animals were contaminated with the Ebola virus. This started a major move in the Health Organization to educate people about safety in the food industry. We must be active in our efforts to also educate people about Christ and the need to follow Him.
- Tell somebody about Jesus daily. As Christians we must evangelize daily. We must

spread the Word about Jesus. Know Him and tell others about Him.

• Be thankful. All over the world there are people being killed, maimed, becoming ill, losing jobs and even killing themselves. We must be thankful that we belong to the LORD, and He is taking care of us.



Approximately 10 years ago after returning from obtaining a PhD in Baltimore, Adrienne had a passion for helping the underserved children in Alabama excel in STEM subjects.

STREAM Innovations, based in Birmingham, was founded by Dr. Starks to address the disparities in STEM education for minorities and the underserved. STREAM stands for Science, Technology, Reading, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics. STREAM Innovation has touched the lives of hundreds of young people – innovators - in Alabama.

On many occasions, Adrienne has stated that God gave her the vision and has provided guidance in accomplishing her work. Countless students have shared how attending STREAM programs have enriched and changed the course of their lives.

Max Transit honored Dr. Starks by placing her picture on a bus that will be traveling throughout the Birmingham Metro area for one year. WBHM radio sponsored a fundraiser to contribute to STREAM Innovations' work in Alabama. The program and fundraiser will be broadcast in the future on WBHM. National Baptist USA Incorporated 2025 First Baptist Church, Fairfield



The National Baptist USA, INC. serves eight African countries and three Island nations. Foreign Mission is still a priority at our Church. Our focus today is on Mission work.

The missionaries are very busy this year as there is so much need throughout the world. Some years ago there was a virus, the Ebola virus, that decimated some 1,500 people, mostly in Liberia, Sierra Leone, and Guinea. The virus began spreading to other countries rapidly, causing death and destruction. It was widely believed that this virus came from the eating of contaminated monkey meat, and bat soup that had been infected with bat droppings. While this may repulse us here in the U.S., eating monkeys and bats is very common in these third world countries. Even in parts of China, Thailand, Guinea, and Australia.

There is much work being done by Missionaries in these countries, and this disease has been contained. In the U.S. we have not had an outbreak of this disease since 2014. We must continue to support foreign mission.


LILLIE DAVIS-FOOT SOLDIER

The other four ladies were: Mrs. Edith Ferguson, Mrs. Louise Shelton, Mrs. Mary James, and Mrs. Elnora Dixon.

We worked three hours for the city and five hours with the neighborhood centers. While working at East End School, we would go to the East End Center on Mulberry St., where Mrs. Emily Butler was the Directress. Some years later, Mr. Stallings moved us to the districts where we live. I was moved to Clark School on Lawrence St. where Mr. Gardner was principal. I then worked at the Carver Center where Ms. Carrie Marshall was supervisor. I later retired from the sewing factory. I am also a licensed beautician. My beauty shop was located on Division St. in East Selma where it was opened afternoons and on Saturdays.

I am also a Foot Soldier and received an award on the 50th Year Anniversary at Brown Chapel Church.
